THE FALL OF THE YEAR AGAIN! The regularity of seasons (Fall, Winter, Spring & Summer) is a wonderful reminder that God is a God of order and not of confusion! *"There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under heaven"* (Ecclesiastes 3:1). *"He has also set eternity in the hearts of men; yet they cannot fathom what God has done from beginning to end"* (3:11). In our ministries in Asia, we can easily see that, even though material possessions can satisfy for a time, people are still searching for meaning in life. God has set eternity in the hearts of men, and that is why we remain in Japan: to tell them they can have an eternal relationship with God, Who has been here all along, if they give their lives fully to Him.



RICKIE'S LADIES' BIBLE CLASS: Rickie's "challenge" (summer homework!) to the ladies in her Bible class during summer break in August was to read through the Proverbs and compare them with similar Japanese proverbs.

They did a good job of that, but one proverb was surprising to them! *"For though a righteous man falls seven times, he rises again, but the wicked are brought down by calamity"* (Proverbs 24:16). This proverb is most often called a Japanese proverb, "Fall down seven times, stand up eight." It is often used in martial arts, and was also used by reporters who marveled at the determination of the Japanese people after the devastating earthquake and tsunami in north-eastern Japan. When Rickie explained to the ladies that this proverb was in the Bible and was attributed to King Solomon many years before it

"became a Japanese proverb," they were amazed!
